What is a mammal?	Mammals are animals that breathe air, grow hair or fur and feed on their mother's milk as a baby.
What are two examples of mammals?	Mammals human mouse dog cow
What is an amphibian?	Amphibians live in the water as babies and on land as they grow older. They have smooth, slimy skin.
What are two examples of amphibians?	Amphibians frog toad newt salamander
What is a reptile?	All reptiles breathe air. They have scales on their skin.
What are two examples of reptiles?	Reptiles Snake tortoise lizard alligator
What is a fish?	Fish live and breathe under water. They have scaly skin, fins to help them swim and they breathe through gills.

What are two examples of fish?	goldfish tuna shark eel
What is a bird?	All birds have a beak, two legs, feathers and wings.
What are two examples of birds?	Penguin Chicken flamingo robin
What is a carnivore?	Animals that mostly eat other animals (meat) are carnivores.
What are some examples of carnivores?	Lion, wolf, leopard, hyena and polar bear.
What is a herbivore?	Animals that only eat plants are herbivores.
What are some examples of herbivores?	Cows, rabbits, chipmunks, squirrels and mice.
What is an omnivore?	Animals that eat both plants and other animals are omnivores.
What are some examples of omnivores?	Bears, birds, dogs, raccoons, foxes, some insects, and even humans.
